

- Initiative to provide the public with tools to counter the lies that are being spread about COVID-19 vaccines.
- Through different digital platforms (Tik Tok, Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, Telegram or smart speakers) we have made available to the public simple guides to identify hoaxes and tools to dismantle them
- More than 12 different videos: how to know if it's a fake tweet, how to detect
 altered or out of context images or videos, be careful with the pre-prints,
 how to deal with viral audios, out-of-context data based on unproven
 effects of vaccines collected in VAERS or Eudravigilance...






Evolution of COVID-19 vaccination in Spain







Covid-19 vaccines disinformation

- Alleged adverse effects of vaccines (EudraVigilance and VAERS data taken out of context).
- Out-of-context images and videos unrelated to the application of vaccines
- Vaccine components (graphene, microchips, magnetic properties, heavy metals)
- Vaccination in children and its alleged adverse effects
- Scams related to vaccines and third dose administration

Preparing for the next infodemic - Keys and reflections

- Intensify collaborative work among verifiers at the international level. And between verifiers, health specialists and academics
- More training in science for citizens and also for journalists (how to read a pre-print, how to know if an article that seems scientific complies with the standards)
- Analyze monetization of disinformers and cut off such sources of funding
- Internal verification processes and departments within the media



How Maldita turned to their community to fight COVID-19 disinformation

Fact-checking a global pandemic

- COVID-19 has highlighted the importance of fact-checking like no other disinformation crisis
- Good information literally saved lives, unlike hoaxes
- That's the reason why it was important to build effective communication bridges with our audience

Phases of COVID-related disinfo. in Spain

- 1. Videos and photos of the situation in China
- 2. Hoaxes about the origin of the virus
- 3. False remedies to avoid coronavirus
- 4. Political disinformation against national and regional governments
- 5. Anti-vax hoaxes
- 6. What was it like in Namibia?



Fact-checking a global pandemic

- Prior to the pandemic, our WhatsApp service was manually managed by one of our reporters
- People sent potential hoaxes for us to verify
- We spotted hoaxes that we weren't seeing on other platforms
- Our service received around 250 daily queries






Fact-checking a global pandemic

- Prior to the pandemic, our WhatsApp service was manually managed by one of our reporters
- People sent potential hoaxes for us to verify
- We spotted hoaxes that we weren't seeing on other platforms
- Our service received around 250 daily queries



And then came COVID-19...







And then came COVID-19...

- It was impossible to manually deal with such a large amount of messages in a time when people needed quick replies
- Due to lockdown, we had to send the mobile to each other with a taxi. NOT ideal
- We weren't able to process all the valuable data that we needed in order to know what hoaxes we should prioritize
- It was clear we needed to automate the whole process

Maldita.es' chatbot

- With such a huge disinformation wave, we automated our service so we could get back to our community ASAP
- This automation meant that all of Maldita's journalists could focus on debunking disinformation

How does it work?

- Besides verifying a potential hoax, users can also request the following:
 - 1. A daily text/audio summary of our debunks
 - 2. Talk to a real human
 - 3. Take media literacy lessons
